

# BAB 2008 Legal Internship Program<sup>1</sup>

2 Options to choose from

*The following is a general outline of the proposed program and itinerary for legal studies related students interning with Bridges Across Borders in Southeast Asia during May - August 2008. The program will be based primarily in Chiang Mai, Thailand; however interns will be offered 2 options.*

**Option 1** - Internship based primarily in Chiang Mai Thailand and may include attending and participating in Community Legal Education (CLE) or Public Legal Education (PLE) Workshops in Vietnam, Laos, Malaysia and Cambodia.

**Option 2** - Internship will be equally split between Chiang Mai, Thailand and Phnom Penh, Cambodia.

*The Legal Internship Program will officially begin May 19<sup>th</sup> and run through August 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2008.*

Overview

The BAB 2008 Legal Internship Program's proposed activities emphasize four main areas: community legal education research and curriculum development, community service, education and culture, and self reflection. During the 11 week experience, activities include a variety of community based legal education teachings, service projects with local and rural communities and many educational events and cultural experiences. The interns will be given the opportunity to work and interact with the BAB International Community Legal Education team as well as local lawyers and legal educators from BAB's partners in the Clinical Legal Education Initiatives in the Southeast Asia region.

The BAB Internship Program offers an opportunity to make a real contribution to fighting the hardships and legal non-equity of Southeast Asia while being involved in a remarkable experience of living and working in the region. This is an experience that is impossible to gain as a simple tourist.

Internship Supervisors

The primary coordination of the overall legal internship program will be done by Michael Otto, BAB's Community Legal Education Program Manager as well as Wendy Morrish, BAB's Southeast Asia Regional CLE Coordinator and US lawyer Bruce A. Lasky who is also BAB's SE Asia Community Legal Education Initiatives Director and an Adjunct Professor at both Chiang Mai University in Thailand and Universiti of Tecknologi Mara (UiTM) in Malaysia.

Additionally, Bridges Across Borders Volunteer Coordinators will assist the overall process. The Program Manager and the Volunteer Coordinators will prepare the orientation materials, create a schedule for the interns, coordinate the projects, assist the interns with any issues (housing, buying food and other necessities, medication, etc),

When interns are not otherwise engaged, they will be working on the Bridges Across Borders Community Empowerment Initiatives – research and development of curriculum for the Community Legal Advisor Training Manuals to be used throughout the region.

The Community Based Legal Advisor Support Program (CLASP) engages both local and international staff members, as well as Law Faculty Clinical Legal Education student volunteers, and a multitude of local legal and grassroots non-governmental organizations. The aim of this work is to produce a variety of Community Based Legal Advisor Training and Resource Manuals which community based legal advisors, ‘paralegals’ and Educators will use in urban and rural communities to both assist and teach local people how to effectively access both the traditional and non-traditional legal justice system.

The overall goal of CLASP is to lend support to a developing network of community based legal advisors and advocates in communities across Southeast Asia who provide legal advice, alternative dispute resolution, referral services, in addition to teaching their respective communities about locally important legal issues.

CLASP has a primary objective of rural legal capacity building through education on everyday legal rights, in topics such as Introduction to Land Law, Property Rights, Family Law, Criminal Law & Procedure, Child Rights, Consumer Protection, Contract Law, & Labor Rights as well as Community based legal advisor skills.

**It is envisaged that during this summer's internship we will be developing booklets for Thailand as well as Cambodia**

Interns will be engaged in a variety of tasks, including but not limited to legal research, reading curriculum for substance as well as proofreading/formatting lesson plans, helping to create and revise lesson plans with the BAB and CLE university teams, joining our teams to assist and monitor the provincial trainings, evaluating the curriculum through the trainings themselves, and synthesizing the participants' evaluations and evaluating through direct observations in order to improve and revise the curriculum. The interns will also be writing a small-group legal research article on a relevant legal area that BAB focuses on. These tasks will all be done in a supportive and progressive atmosphere that is committed to nurturing public service, developing the capacity of local communities, as well as promoting social justice in the Southeast Asia region.

Interns will gain knowledge about Bridges Across Borders, the areas we work in, our projects and issues (both legal and non-legal related). The interns will be directly involved with our projects and issues helping them understand what work they are doing and the reasons and need for it. Interns will also be participating in two Community Immersion Activity Weeks, to take place in Northern Thailand and Kep, Cambodia.

During this time, the interns will experience what it is like to live and work in a rural community, working on some of the BAB community development projects as well as with other non-governmental organizations BAB works in conjunction with.

Legal interns will also be encouraged to take weekend trips on their own or with local law students or legal trainers to teach with some of our partner organizations. Bridges Across Borders has been, and continues to be, involved with partner organizations and universities teaching law, civics and human rights, and a number of related

subjects, applying the CLE Street Law methodology, to children, teenagers, and adults in both rural villages and urban communities.

Interns staying fulltime in Thailand will receive Thai language lessons 2-3 times per week. Interns who are doing the split between Thailand and Cambodia are welcome to join the program while they are in Thailand and an introduction to Khmer language will be offered when they are in Phnom Penh.

Thai and/or Khmer cooking classes will be offered to the interns approximately once per week. The interns will be taken to the markets where they will learn what the different herbs and spices are that are used in Thai and/or Khmer cooking. The cooking classes will run for the duration of the internship.

During the internship there will be many opportunities for exposure visits to some of the areas and marginalized communities BAB is working with, both formally through the internship or on people's own discretion. These include but are not limited to the following places:

By working in the field with the communities and other community-based activities, the legal interns gain a better understanding of our community empowerment programs. This is an opportunity to process the experiences in order to help the interns to more fully understand and improve their efforts and connect their work to a greater cause and motivate them to continue their involvement in social justice activities.

Regardless of whether you are full time in Thailand or splitting your internship between Thailand and Cambodia, your role as an intern is to assist BAB in multi-faceted ways with an ability to be flexible and proactive.

***Legal interns will be expected to work a minimum of 40 hours per week for the entirety of the Legal Internship Program.***

# 2008 Legal Internship Program Draft Itinerary

The program will be an 11 week program (including 2 immersion weeks and an 'off-week' for personal travel within the region). The program will begin in Chiang Mai, Thailand with the full group of interns and finish in Kep on the southern coast of Cambodia. ***Please keep in mind that this is a tentative itinerary and may be revised as needed.***

Week	Tentative Activity
Week 1 19 May - 25 May	<b>Week 1: Orientation &amp; Introduction to the program held in Chiang Mai, Thailand.</b>
Week 2 26 May – 1 June	<b>Weeks 2 &amp; 3 will be the beginning of work in Chiang Mai, Thailand</b> These two weeks will focus strongly on the educational component of the program, including a study abroad course with a full intern syllabus, including legal social justice readings ( <i>Depending on your university, this may be an accredited class</i> ). During this time interns will also learn lesson plan development writing and legal manual formatting. This section of the program will occur in Chiang Mai, with all of the interns present and supervised by BAB Director Professor Bruce A. Lasky, (J.D, LL.M.).
Week 3 2 June – 8 June	
Week 4 9 June – 15 June	<b>Week 4: Immersion Activity Week for whole group in Chiang Mai</b> This will be the first Immersion Activity Week with the whole group and will take place in the mountains of Northern Thailand outside of Chiang Mai and will include community based activities with a social justice theme (camping style accommodation).
Week 5 16 June – 22 June	<b>Week 5: OFF WEEK – Thailand Group 'got maai' (law – Thai) stays on in Chiang Mai / Cambodia Group 'chabaab' (law – Khmer) transits to Phnom Penh</b> This will be a designated off-week. The intern group will be split in two with the Cambodia 'chabaab' group traveling overland to Phnom Penh (PP) and the Thailand 'got maai' group remaining in Chiang Mai (CM). This week is also allotted for those interns who would like to travel in the region outside of the internship program.
Week 6 23 June – 29 June	<b>Weeks 6 -9: Thailand Group 'got maai' continues work in CM / Cambodia Group 'chabaab' begins work in PP. Both Groups continue working, teaching and conducting other activities through the end of Week 9</b> These weeks will be spent working as split groups in CM and PP. These weeks will be devoted to further curriculum development, continued legal research, and teaching and training in legal areas with university or civil society partners. Research topic presentations and seminars at partner universities or NGO's, work directly with partner NGO's, project site visits and other activities.
Week 7 30 June – 6 July	
Week 8 7 July – 13 July	
Week 9 14 July – 20 July	
Week 10 21 July – 27 July	<b>Week 10: Both Groups complete work product – Thailand Group 'got maai' travels overland to Phnom Penh</b> This week will be dedicated to the completion of group work product and wrapping up of projects. During this week, the Thailand Group 'got maai' will travel overland to join the Cambodia Group 'chabaab' in Phnom Penh.
Week 11 28 July – 3 August	<b>Week 11: Immersion Activity Week for whole group and Program End</b> This will be the second Immersion Activity Week and group farewells. The whole group of interns will travel to the BAB Kep Community Center on the coast of Cambodia. This week will include community based activities on-site with a social justice theme (camping style accommodation).

# Program Costs

## Program Costs

*The following is a breakdown of some costs each intern will incur*

Program Administration Fee US\$1600  
*(this fee does not include the \$100 Donation below)*

Bridges Across Borders is a grassroots organisation where many of the staff and directors receive a very small amount of income for their work. Nevertheless, in order to function, our organization does incur a low level of administration expense. This fee helps us cover these costs to administer the internship while being able to continue our work in the region.

The Program Administration Fee includes:

- Site visit transport
- Overland transit from Chiang Mai to Phnom Penh
- Two Immersion Activity Weeks (Thailand & Cambodia)
- Weekly cooking and language classes
- Airport pickup
- Internet (certain restrictions apply in Cambodia)
- Administration costs
- Supervision & coordination costs

The Program Administration Fee does not include:

- Airfare
- Accommodation
- Visas
- Food
- Daily transit to and from work

*\*Please note that transit back to Thailand at the completion of the program is not included, which should be considered upon booking airfare. Bangkok is in between Chiang Mai, Thailand and Phnom Penh, Cambodia with the option of flights, trains or buses from Bangkok to either destination.*

## Additional Costs other than Program Costs

### Housing & Food

There will be other costs that are not included in the program fees. Below are some estimates of some of these living expenses:

#### Accommodation/Food

Accommodation and housing will be a primary expense falling outside the program fees. Accommodation ranges approximately from \$250 – 400 USD, cost of which also depends on whether rooms are shared and/or other amenities. Guesthouses will be the most common housing arrangement due to the short term time period of the program. BAB staff will be on-hand to assist and make suggestion in finding comfortable housing.

There are BAB volunteer houses in both Chiang Mai and Phnom Penh, which are safe, inexpensive, comfortable, and the rooms have air conditioning and hot water. BAB does not make profit from your rent and food, the fees are budgeted in line with the basic running costs of the intern's needs. However, there is limited space available and requested rooms will be granted on a first-come, first-serve basis.

Food is relatively cheap and very delicious in Southeast Asia. An estimated food budget per month ranges from \$150 – 350 USD, depending on how much one cooks or goes out to eat. Phnom Penh, Cambodia is generally a bit more expensive for food.

### Visas

#### Visas

Visas for the 11-week Legal Internship Program will total approximately \$100 USD, including incidental costs in obtaining and renewing them. More information will be available upon acceptance or check with the Thai/Cambodia Consulate in your home country.

### Travel/ Incidentals

#### Travel/Incidentals

You will be responsible for paying for any local travel (moto, tuk tuk, taxi, bus, tours, etc.), restaurant meals or shopping that you might wish to enjoy during your stay. Itinerary trips to other towns or provinces are usually by bus, the price will vary between US\$4—US\$10 depending on destination. An approximate cost might average \$100 USD, which depends on the individual person's desire for travel and comfort.

### Workshops

#### Workshop Participation outside Thailand or Cambodia

Interns wishing to attend CLE workshops in countries outside Thailand & Cambodia will be responsible to pay their own way for all costs if they are interested in voluntarily attending.

# Selection Criteria for the Legal Internship Program

*Participation in the program is by competitive application. Applicants are invited to indicate their preference for a fulltime internship in Thailand or the Thailand/Cambodia split internship. It is permissible to apply at the same time for both internships options.*

## Application Preferences

Selection for an internship will require that applicants have:

- A strong academic record
- An interest and/or showing of work in the area of human rights, social justice and community service
- Cultural awareness and sensitivity
- The willingness to commit to the minimum required period of time in the internship program

Interns are expected to be:

- Well organized
- Self-motivated and able to work within a group and individually
- Able to adapt to a varying workload in a multicultural environment
- Responsible and willing to take ownership of their work product
- Strong team builders
- Able to work and live in a close, communal environment
- Proactive

Interns are expected to have competencies of:

- Adaptability and flexibility
- Team work
- Self-initiative and enthusiasm
- Meticulousness concerning accuracy and quality

Selection & allocation of participants is the joint responsibility of the Program Manager and the CLE Initiatives Director. The details of an individual interns' activities are to be determined by their Supervisors in consultation with each intern at the commencement of the internship.

As ambassadors for the BAB Legal Internship Program in Southeast Asia, successful applicants will be expected to assist with the exposure of the internship program, completing assigned work product and reflecting on the overall experience. This will involve:

1. Keeping a weekly individual reflective journal.
2. Writing an overview at the completion of the internship, reflecting on the experience and evaluating it.
3. Writing a collective small group legal research article to be completed prior to the end of the internship program.
4. Committing to prepare and deliver a reflective presentation on your placement experience with Bridges Across Borders in Southeast Asia at your respective law school or a similar institution.
5. Continuing through the internship to the program end date.
